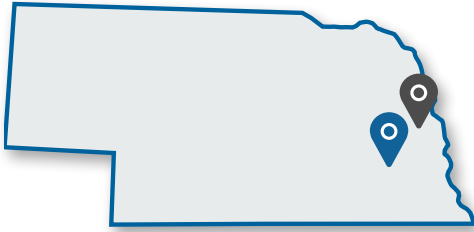

OBJECTIVES

- 1 Understand the extremist violence construct and its applicability to threat assessment concepts.
- 2 Apply the concepts of the escalatory process of extremist violence to the targeted violence pathway.
- 3 Identify and analyze indicators of extremist violence mobilization.
- 4 Evaluate the influence of mental illness symptoms on extremist beliefs.
- 5 Formulate central questions for clinical professional to use in practice.
- 6 Discuss and evaluate key threat assessment and management considerations.
